A Party of 30 From the Middle States.

TO EXAMINE THE EVA MINE

The Big Deals That Have Been Put Through During the Season Have Been, a Good Advertisement for Lardeau.

A meeting of the Northwestern Development Syndicate was held last Friday in the company's office, Nelson. A party consisting of about 30 shareholders from Michigan were present. Very little business was transacted the meeting adjourning for a week until the big party visited the mines. On Saturday the Americans accompanied by A. H. Gracey, manager of the Imperial Development Syndicate, George Kidd, manager of the Royal Bank, A. Byers, manager of the Mac Machine Co., Trill; A. H. Kelly and H. Bird, of Nelson. The Stewmen Rossland took the party in to Comaplx where all available horses in that section had been ordered ahead. The party reached Fish Creek camp Sunday night. The Ambrose mine was visited Monday and also the new town of Goldfields, which is within a few hundred yards of the mine. On Tuesday the party visited the Eva and returned to Nelson Wednesday.

Big Mining Deal.

A big mining deal was closed in Vancouver on Tuesday in the purchase by a syndicate of Indianapolis and Terre Haute, Ind., of the Portland and other claims for \$100,000. These claims are situated about 20 miles south of Nicola lake, on the divide between the Similkameen and Nicola rivers. The sale was made by J. E. Bate of Kamloops.

A seam of coal six feet wide has been discovered in the centre of the city of Vancouver on Abbott street. The find was made while digging for foundations.

Four hundred Irish pilgrims were presented to the pope by Cardinal Moran on the 25th. The pontiff appeared in his sedan chair surrounded by the papal court, and was enthusiastically received by those present, each of whom kissed his hand. The company included representatives of the Irish municipalities.

Cyclist's Neck Broken.

Frank D. Elwell of Brooklyn, an international authority on motor cycling and frequent contributor to the magazines devoted to this sport, has been killed near Hicksville, L. I., while participating in a club run.

The head stem of his machine broke as he was speeding along at a fast clip and he was hurled to the ground with such force that his neck was broken. Elwell had travelled through Europe, Asia and Northern Africa on the machine that caused his death. There were 72 cyclists in the party. Elwell was the last man in the string. As the party neared Hicksville he put on full power in order to catch up with the others and while crossing the railway tracks his machine suddenly fell apart. When a physician reached him he was dead.

AN INTERVIEW

With Judge Miller in Rossland

ON ARRIVAL FROM LARDEAU

He Tells of the Work Done This Year. Greater Advances Made Than in Any Two Years of its History.

The Lardeau country has made greater advances this year than in any two previous years in its history," said Judge J. W. Miller this week on his arrival in Rossland from the Lardeau district, where he has spent the entire summer in the interest of the various companies with which he is identified.

"The Canadian Pacific Railway," he continued, "has done twice or three the business it expected to do when the line was under construction, which is an excellent indication of the country's advance. There has been a very large importation of machinery of every description and supplies. More rich strikes have been made in old properties and more valuable new properties located than was ever the case in any one year previously, and the conditions are decidedly favorable.

The operators on the Duncan river side of the Trout Lake divide expect transportation next spring. The Great Northern, or interests closely allied with Dr. Hill's, have had their originator—Mr. Gray—in the Duncan Valley all season.

"I have not been able to secure a definite statement from the Great Northern people as to when construction will be started, but I am satisfied that it will be next spring and that an electric road will be built."

Judge Miller is actively identified with the management of the Old Gold, Primrose, Guinea Gold and Marie Muller properties, all operating in the Old Gold camp on the Duncan river side of the divide. He states that excellent progress has been made with the development of all four properties during the past season, and that the Guinea Gold particularly has shown up splendidly. On the Old Gold the principal work during the summer was the driving of a 324 tunnel to tap the vein at a vertical depth of some 200 feet. A crosscut has been run to intersect the ore and this has almost been attained. In the upper workings a shaft was sunk some 20 feet on the vein now being tapped at depth. It was shown to carry eight to fourteen inches of solid ore averaging \$100 per ton.

In company with D. Gifford of Minneapolis, managing director of the Marie Muller and Guinea Gold companies, Judge Miller brought out a shipment of 15 tons of ore from the Old Gold Camp. The ore will be sent to the Trail smelter for test purposes.

The Eva mine, the largest free-gold property in the Lardeau camp, in which experts estimate there is enough pay ore blocked out to keep a ten-stamp mill running for four years, was recently sold to a company of underwriters. A company to be known as Calumet and British Columbia Gold Mines, Ltd., to be incorporated under the laws of this province, is taking over the property on which active work will be started at once.—Mining News.

The Eaton strike is still on in Toronto.

Will Visit King Edward.

Emperor William of Germany, and King Charles of Portugal will visit King Edward on Nov. 8. It is expected that the meeting of the three monarchs will result in important international understandings, especially as regards South Africa and more particularly Delagoa Bay, which is so important to Great Britain as an outlet for her newly acquired colonies. The Portuguese government appears to be willing to transfer some portion of its South African territory to British rule. Germany objects to Britain securing such an advantage, unless Portugal is willing to placate Germany by granting her some similar concessions. It is believed that before the visitors leave England a bargain will be arranged.

C. P. R. Lands.

It is not long since the general opinion was that the C. P. R. would not be able to dispose of its land grant within the next hundred years.

A year ago the road had about 18,000,000 acres of land on its hands, today it has not more than 15,000,000, and the sales of 1902 will probably total 3,000,000 acres. The time when it will not have an acre of land on its hands for sale, therefore, appears to be within measurable distance. The land office is crowded daily with land-seekers and speculators, and the purchases are not now confined to the Western States, but the fever for securing lands in Western Canada has spread until there are purchasers from nearly every state in the union, here.—Calgary Herald.

Aid For Ferguson Hospital.

The miners and business men of Ferguson have united to erect a hospital here. This is an absolute necessity as there is no place in which we can properly care for a sick man who does not happen to have a home of his own. There has been about \$1,500 subscribed towards the hospital locally and the Eagle has been requested to receive subscriptions from outside points which will be acknowledged through the columns of the Eagle each week. There is something like \$1,500 more to raise and we hope that those who have made money in this camp will remember those who work away from the comforts of older communities and send along a liberal sum to help in the good work. The woman pioneer of Mount Sir Donald is Mrs. Berens of Kent, who made the ascent when on her honeymoon trip around the world several months ago. She was the more anxious to make the ascent as she had heard that a Philadelphia lady was eager to gain the laurel.

STRONG COMPANY

Formed to Work a Lardeau Property

WELL KNOWN BEATRICE MINE

Incorporated as the Beatrice Mines, Limited, with a Capital of \$500,000. Controlled by a Strong Syndicate.

A company has been formed in Revelstoke with the following as provisional directors: Frank Fulmer, Mrs. Anderson, A. E. Kincaid, G. S. McCarter and J. M. Doyle.

The property which this company will operate is the famous Beatrice at the head of Mohawk creek near the Oyster-Criterion. The Capitalization of the company is \$500,000. The Beatrice has the reputation of being one of the best properties in the Lardeau and with the strong company that now has it something good should be heard from that source. There was considerable development work done on the property during the past year and several rich strikes were made. One particularly rich lead of free gold was encountered about a month since and another silver-lead lead has been found quite recently. The galena found on the property is very high grade, carrying a lot of grey copper. It is the intention of the company to do extensive development work during the winter and next season the Beatrice will be found one of the largest shippers in the Lardeau. If there was a good wagon road to Boston the Beatrice could ship a high grade quality of ore continuously.

County Court.

County court was held at Trout Lake on Tuesday of this week, the Hon. Justice Forin Presiding, when the following short docket was disposed of:

Davis vs. Mountain Lion Co. This was an adjourned case from the September court. After hearing the evidence His Honor decided that J. R. Daves was not in a position to bind the company by what he did and therefore the case was dismissed with costs. R. Hodge for plaintiff, F. C. Elliott for defendant.

The next case was McKinley vs. Gordon & Slinger. This was an action to recover from defendants an amount due plaintiff by Andy Cummings for wages when said Cummings owned the Balmoral hotel. Plaintiff alleged that defendants agreed to pay the claim when they took over the hotel. His Honor held that such an agreement was not proven, but that defendants simply agreed to pay plaintiff out of proceeds of the Cummings book accounts that might be collected. The action was accordingly dismissed with costs. K. Hodge for plaintiff, A. J. Gordon conducted the defence for self and partner.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The progress made during the season now closing in the building and general improvement line in Ferguson has been satisfactory. There has not been so much building on the main street as was expected but most of the buildings in the business part of the town were altered or improved by paint or balcony and this portion of the town presents a smarter appearance than it did a year ago. It was, however, in the residential portion where the town advanced. Several new streets were cleared and opened up, a number of dwellings were erected, and others were enlarged. A large hospital was built and altogether there is a marked improvement in the general appearance of the town. One year ago Ferguson was a small village while today she has risen to the dignity of a town, and a town having most of the modern conveniences that go to provide comfort and contentment for its citizens. A year ago Arrowhead was the nearest express office. Now there is one at Trout Lake but four miles distant. Last fall steamboat connection with the railway was 16 miles distant, now it is but four. Thus Ferguson is progressing and emerging steadily and surely from her isolation in the wilderness, so to speak.

It is but reasonable to hope that ere another twelve months have swung round Ferguson may have direct railway connection.

What is bringing about this advancement? Not the push and enterprise of her citizens, oh no, except in a few instances. It is the great mineral wealth in the hills about Ferguson that is boosting town and district. The rich ores of the camp have attained a world wide reputation and the camp is only beginning to reap the benefits. Truly the camp has a bright future in store, as well as Ferguson town.

Last winter Ferguson had a very good literary and debating society which continued to hold interesting meetings till late in the spring. Had it not been for these literary gatherings once a week Ferguson-ites would have found time dragging heavily during the winter. It appears to us that steps should be taken to organize a similar society for the coming winter. While the meetings of last winter were successful and interesting a similar organization should prove even more successful in 1903-4, for the town is large and we consider there has been a considerable acquisition in talent. Let us hold a meeting and organize something;

either a literary society or a mock parliament. We believe the latter would be preferable, it would at least be a change. There is no reason why ladies should not take part as freely in a mock parliament as in a literary society, and we believe the former is more successful in bringing out and developing latent talent than a literary society.

We will take it upon ourselves to call a meeting to consider the advisability of organizing, and we trust there may be a representative turnout of citizens. Eagle hall will therefore be open at 8 o'clock Tuesday night, Nov 4th, for a meeting and all are invited to be present.

The weather all over the Lardeau is delightful and has been all fall. This has been an important factor in helping forward the work that is being most vigorously prosecuted in the Ferguson camp. The building of tramways, the installation of compressor plants, electric light and waterworks can be accomplished so much better and more cheaply with warm dry days and a clear sky overhead. Most autumns find a lot of work left unfinished on account of wet, cold weather! People have a bad tendency to leave work off too late and the work laid out cannot be finished. This season has proven an exception in the Lardeau for the long spell of good weather has given the most tardy a chance.

If a stray dam—n should be found anywhere in the columns of the Eagle this week, we trust our readers will treat such wicked profanity in a spirit of lenience. Our excuse will be that both the editor and the printer spent more time than we would care to admit in putting up a stove pipe that stretched above the type cases. The wicked devil just stood back and laughed.
