Impressions of a British Editor

WINTERS MILD AND GENIAL

The Farmer Can Have All, and More, Than In The Best Agricultural Counties of England.

The following is a fair description of the richest province in Canada and is taken from the Leeds Mercury and reproduced in the Spokesman Review. It is the result of the editor's recent visit.

Mines, fisheries and forests constitute the natural wealth of British Columbia. To these may be added agriculture, which is yet in its infancy but for which a future is in store probably equally rich, and incalculable as their apparently inexhaustible wealth is, more durable than any of the others. At present it takes from \$100 to \$180 to reclaim an acre of land in the fertile valleys of British Columbia and when after prodigious labor, the land has been put under cultivation unremitting tillage is required to prevent the bush gaining ascendancy. If land is left in pasture for three or four seasons a dense infantile growth of willow proclaims the supremacy of the native flora, the beauty of the climate and the fertility of the land. British Columbia at present imports a large part of its food supply. The farmers of the Okanagan valley and the Fraser River Delta cannot cope with the ever increasing demands of the cities of Vancouver and Victoria, and the mining camps of the southern districts; and in addition to these, a new demand has sprung up in Dawson city and the Yukon.

To farm in British Columbia requires capital, but here farming has many attractions superior to those of Manitoba. The winter is mild and genial in addition. The citizens of Vancouver and Victoria would think it a severe winter indeed if there were no roses blooming in their gardens on Christmas Day. The English farmer who acquires land in British Columbia can have all, and more than all that he has in the best agricultural counties of England. His house is surrounded by orchards, shrubberies and lawns; he is within easy access of a home market and every thing that he rears is equally remunerative. He obtains splendid prices for all the minor products of his farm, poultry, dairy produce and fruit, and can never rear sufficient to meet the demand. His only trouble is with the native vegetation, the persistent encroachment of which renders it difficult to farm upon a large scale. English farmers with a few hundred pounds of capital who are minded to throw up the anxieties of farming in the Old Country and make a bid for fortunes in Canada, would be well advised not to settle in Manitoba or the Territories until they have paid a visit to British Columbia, where they would find an equally bright prospect of making money, and to my mind a desirable mode of living. It is possible even for those who have little or no capital to make money by farming here, but

English farmers are seldom successful in a venture of this description. Along the new lines of railways and the steamboat routes up the lakes you find French and Swiss settlers, who burn out an acre or two of timber start in with a few cows, and by selling cream, milk and butter push a lucrative trade along the lines of communication. Far in the recesses of the lakes and mountains you often strike these settlers, whose picturesque wooden houses perched on some rocky promontory, at once bring all the peripatetic photographers into action.

Ascroft is out with another potato yarn, but this time it is a fish story. Dr. Reynolds has not yet published it in the Vancouver Ledger, but he says he believes every word. Stage driver McInnes says: "In crossing the Fraser river with the stage coming from the Chilcooten I saw the biggest fish I ever saw in my life, and I tell you I have seen some pretty big ones. I think it must have been a sea serpent for it was at the least calculation 60 feet long. Miss Booth and Miss Davis, who were passengers, also saw it. They can vouch for my statements.—Independent.

Ferguson, Oct. 31.—Robert Scott is at work setting up the o.e. shed for the Great Western Mines adjoining the open shed used by the Cup people for their overflow product last winter. The way traffic has increased during the past few months since the railway opened for business, there will be mighty little change for such ore storage in the big freight sheds of the C. P. R.

This is now kept pretty well filled with the freight and express brought and although it was thought that the rush would be all over in a couple of months after the road had been started running there is no sign of diminutions yet. Every boat arriving brings with it a load of freight and pretty nearly every trip the big 80 foot barge has been required to move the freight from Trout Lake to Gerrard.

Mining machinery forms the greatest portion of the traffic now keeping the Lardo branch busy, and the requirements for this is by no means exhausted as yet. Very shortly now, a compressor plant for the Sunshine tunnel at the Cup, will arrive and with other requirements in the line made necessary by the thoroughly up to date methods of the management now in control of the Cup and Nettie L., it is pretty certain that the movement of mining machinery Lardward has only just commenced.—World, Rossland.

Miner Earned to Death.
 William Edwards a miner of Camp McKenny was burned in his cabin on Whisky hill on Oct. 30th. It appears that Edwards and several others had been on a protracted spree for several days. His fellow revelers left him between 6 and 7 o'clock Tuesday evening. Later he procured a bottle of whiskey and proceeded up the hill towards his cabin. About 3 o'clock Wednesday morning a fire was seen in that direction, but not much notice was taken of it, as it was thought someone had lighted a fire in the woods. It was not discovered until late in the day that Edwards cabin had been burned. The heat was too great to allow of the ruin being examined until next morning when a search resulted in the finding of the body. Edwards has no relatives in this country but has a nephew in England his native land.

Nettie L. Boiler Inspected.
 G. O. Madigan, inspector of stationary boilers, Nelson, was in Ferguson last week and inspected the boiler of the air compressor plant at the Nettie L. The plant will be in operation shortly.

TRAM RUNNING

Buckets Were Strung on Wednesday.

TO THE TRIUNE MINE

The Tram was Given a Trial Thursday and Worked Satisfactorily. The Line will be Completed Saturday.

The uncertainty about getting the Triune tramway completed before the winter set in is now past and gone. The tram is about finished and has been given a trial which proves it to run satisfactorily. Only the finishing touches have yet to be given and these will be completed by Saturday. The Triune can now continue operations all through the winter. Superintendent Gendler has got the mine in a splendid state of development and there is a fine lot of ore blocked out ready to be mined and shipped during the winter. New quarters for the men have been built for the employees close to the workings and out of danger of snow slides. A site was secured by blasting an opening in the side of the mountain.

The Triune has come rapidly to the front under the management of J. A. McCrossan and now ranks in the first row of the Lardeau mines.

Big Meat Combine.

Consolidation of all the big stockyards of the United States under one management is contemplated by leading interests in the properties, and plans will likely be carried out after completion of the deal to merge the beef packing industries. The amount of stock will be \$500,000,000. The consolidation will include the Armour, Swift and Morris and other properties in Chicago, and of course the Hammond and Anglo-American, Omaha, and other properties they have purchased to put in the deal, and the Cudahy and Salsberger companies.

It is probable that Gustavus F. Swift will be president and J. Ogden Armour chairman of Board of Directors.

A Stab at Sifton's Department.

A recent issue of La Patrie says: "The government of British Columbia has just refused an entrance into the territory of that province, to groups of Doukhobors, who desired to leave the Canadian Northwest. "We believe that the government of

British Columbia is altogether right. We have imported within the last two or three years, at much expense and with a great deal of advertising, thousands of immigrants, who are rather a source of annoyance and of peril than of benefit.

"A man very well versed in immigration matters, told us yesterday that in a colony of recently arrived immigrants, there were not five absolutely sane persons.

We must naturally desire that our country should be peopled as rapidly as possible. On the other hand it is of the highest importance that we should not admit among our sober, laborious honorable Canadian people elements of national dissolution. We do not want here the scum of Europe. Let us develop in a reasonable manner along ordinary rules of prudence."

The miners and business men of Ferguson have united to erect a hospital here. This is an absolute necessity as there is no place in which we can properly care for a sick man who don't happen to have a home of his own. There has been about \$1,500 subscribed towards the hospital locally and the Eagle has been requested to receive subscriptions from outside points which will be acknowledged through the columns of the Eagle each week. There is something like \$1,500 more to raise and we hope that those who have made money in this camp will remember those who work away from the comforts of older communities and send along a liberal sum to help in the good work. The hospital will be owned and operated by the members of Lardeau Miners' Union. Address all subscriptions to New Subscribers.

Cromwell Bonded.

The Macoe Exploration Co., Ltd., which a few days ago took an option for one year on the Cromwell, Amnec.

Cromwell No. 2, Edison, T. L., and Calcutta fractions and Mazama No. 2 located on Cromwell mountain for a sum totaling in shares of the company at one dollar each, \$50,000, is one of the few companies adopting a level-headed plan in their capitalization. Their capitalization is 150,000 shares of the value of \$1.00 each and 100,000 shares of this is set aside for development purposes, the balance we presume being vested in the first cost of the property they purpose to develop. According to the terms of agreement work has not got to commence before June next, but W. Davis who has conducted the negotiations for the company has already sent up a large quantity of Supplies and has called for tenders for the driving of 200 feet of tunnel. Thus the winter will not be lost and when the season opens up next year the company will be in position to know what plans for the future they will adopt.—Topic.

Crown Prince William of Germany, who fell in love with the daughter of Mrs. Deacon is reported engaged to the Princess Alice of Albany. Princess Alice is a charming daughter of royalty and would likely prove more popular in Germany than have other English women of exalted station. The date of the royal wedding will soon be announced.

THE DOUKHOBORS

Fanatics Desire to Find "New Life."

AN INJURY TO ANY COUNTRY

The Government Should Herd Them Over to the Vicinity of Hudson's Bay and Appoint Sifton Governor of the Colony.

About 400 Doukhobor men who left their villages in the neighborhood of Yorkton a few days ago for the purpose of evangelizing the world are in Yorkton. They are spending their time praying and singing. Eleven hundred men women and children altogether, arrived in three sections, wearing scarcely any clothing and camping out nights until Yorkton was reached. One child died on the road. They look much the worse for their spare diet and long tramp. The offer of shelter and food made by the townspeople was refused. They desire, they say to convert people and find "The New Life."

The government officials are at a loss to know what to do. The Mounted police are following and watching them closely.

The Black Warrior.

Acting on instructions received from the company operating the Black Warrior, S. Shannon, the local manager, made a trip Saturday to the mine through two feet of newly fallen snow to instruct the men to come down pending a meeting of the shareholders. The company are taking over some outlying interests in the property. This does not mean a closedown for the winter but only for a week or two. When foreman Brown and his men quit work the property was looking good.

Trustee Elected.

There was a small attendance at the school meeting Saturday night on account of the wet weather, however there were enough present to transact the necessary business satisfactorily. E. G. Woodward was voted to the chair and A. C. Cummings was elected secretary of the meeting. On motion of J. C. Kirkpatrick, seconded by W. H. Howard, J. Q. McKinnon was elected a school trustee to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of S. Shannon. This was carried unanimously.

The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Daily Mail cables that there is an epidemic of measles on the Kamtchatka peninsula. Ten thousand persons have died of the disease and the population of some country villages have been nearly wiped out.

Montreal, Oct. 31.—The Star's London cable says: The high commissioner is receiving practical support from the colonials of the various African districts, where South African soldier reservists have been discharged, in his efforts to induce those who have been unable to obtain employment to seek indication that a large number will proceed to Canada in the spring, the Elder-Demeter lines having promised reduced passages.—Mher.

One of the most important undertakings of the present century has at last been accomplished in the successful laying of the Pacific Cable that has been the dream of Imperialists for years past and is now an actual reality. While the actual laying of the cable has taken place it will not be open for business for a few weeks yet, which time will be taken up in an elaborate system of tests. The section between Bamfield Creek and Fanning Island, which is the largest in the world, has already undergone a series of tests and has proved entirely equal to expectations. The great question in the success of the cable was over this enormous stretch, but it was found to give too words a minute with the Deere love transmitter. The actual time taken in the transmission of a message from Vancouver to Sydney, Australia, will be less than five minutes in the case of a short commercial message and this time will nearly all be taken in the manual repetition of the message at Bamfield Creek, Fanning Island, Norfolk Island and Brisbane.

The South African situation situation is recognized by the British government as very grave. The feeling between the British and Dutch in Cape town is said to be more bitter just now than it was in days before the war. Former Free State and Transvaal colors are now worn freely in the Dutch towns of the Cape and sedition is openly predicted. Hon. Joseph Chamberlain has gone to South Africa to look into the matter.

A new paper is spoken of for Montreal to supplant Mr. Tarte's Patrie which was the government organ for the province but now it is taken for granted has turned against the government. It is rumored that Mr. Langlois, editor of La Patrie, has resigned and will become editor of the French-Liberal organ to be established to replace La Patrie.

Arrangements have been made by the Dominion Cattle Breeders' Association with the Canadian Pacific Railway for transportation at reduced rates of pure bred cattle sheep and hogs. The association also undertakes to facilitate individuals in purchasing stock.

Ed. Morgan met with a nasty accident at the Nettie L. which laid him up for a few days, being bruised by sacks of ore falling on him one day last week.

The B. C. Indians believe that the coming winter will be a repetition of that of 1889. They look upon the recent eclipse as a portent, and consequently a large party have gone out to hunt food, skins and furs in preparation for their anticipated cold snap.

A congratulatory cable message to King Edward reached Buckingham palace last Saturday morning, being the first message sent over the new Pacific cable which links the British empire together.

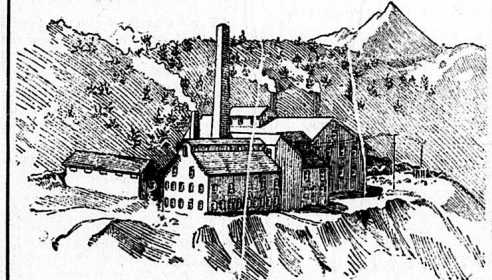
