ELECTION RUMORS

Laurier May Appeal to the Country.

MAY BE DOMINION CONTEST

That Will be Brought on Before Christmas. The Country Now in an Unsettled State on Account of Uncertainty re Tariff

It seems to be not at all unlikely that a general Federal election will be brought on before the end of the present year, some of the eastern papers have even set a date. The recent dismissal of Hon. J. I. Tarte from the administration has brought about a very unsettled state of affairs in the Liberal party. Tarte's protective tariff utterances had many warm sympathizers in the party.

The principal kick, however, is from the manufacturing concerns and business houses throughout the country. The uncertainty in regard to the tariff hurts their business and the only way to settle the tariff question satisfactorily is an appeal to the country.

If the elections are brought on before Christmas it will be hard to forecast the probable result. It would be a pretty run. The Liberals would most likely lead in the maritime provinces. In Quebec the Conservatives would most likely have a majority, especially if Tarte does what he is expected to do and ally himself with his old love the Conservatives. He has many admirers in Quebec and elsewhere and he will no doubt have a considerable following from the Liberal ranks. Ontario is pretty evenly divided in the local houses, in fact more votes were cast for Tories than for Liberals in the last Provincial election, so the province would likely elect a majority of Conservatives in a Federal contest.

The Doukhobors.

The Doukhobor fanatics have been forcefully entertained by the North West Mounted police and taken back to their village near Yorkton, Assn., N. W. T.

When arrested they cried: "No! We go to seek Jesus. Only about 29 out of the 500 escaped and they are on the prairie with a temperature which means death to them. While on the train the captives sang and prayed incessantly. Asking divine assistance to turn the hearts of their captors that they might be released.

The Delineator.

The Christmas (December) number, of the Delineator is also the thirteenth anniversary number. To do justice to this number, which for beauty and utility touches the highest mark, it would be necessary to print the entire list of contents. It is sufficient to state that in it the best modern writers and artists are generously represented. The book contains over 230 pages, with 40 full page illustrations, of which 20 are in two or more colors. The magnitude of this December number, for which 828 tons of paper and six tons of ink have been used may be understood from the fact that 91 presses running 14 hours a day have been required to print it; the binding alone of the edition of 915,000 copies representing over 20,000,000 sections which had to be gathered individually by human hands.

"Ore In Sight."

The institution of mining and metallurgy, London; has forwarded to the Commissioner of Crown Lands a memorandum dealing with the question of reports of "ore in sight." Considerable confusion has occurred owing to indiscriminate use of the term "ore in sight" to indicate two separate factors in an estimate, viz: ore blocked out and exposed on three sides and ore that may reasonably be assumed to exist, although not actually blocked out. These two factors should be kept distinct, the first being governed by fixed rules, while the latter is dependent on individual judgement and local experience. The institution therefore holds that in making use of the term "ore in sight" an engineer should demonstrate that the ore so denominated is capable of being profitably extracted under the working conditions obtaining in the district. The council of the institute urge its members to observe this rule and strongly advise that no ambiguity or mystery in this connection should be tolerated, as they consider that such ambiguity is an indication of dishonesty or incompetency.

Eight men were drowned in a storm at Nume on Oct. 14th.

W. K. Vanderbilt has been sentenced to two days imprisonment in Paris for reckless automobilism.

The cable rate to Australia has been made by the Pacific Cable Company at the rate from Canada to Australia of two shillings, four pence per word.

U. S. ELECTIONS

Republicans Have a Majority in South

THE REPUBLICAN PARTY

Make Large Gains in Western States. In Montana Had Blood Between Clark and Heinze Caused State to go Republican.

The United States elections took place on Nov. 4th and the result created considerable surprise in many of the states especially in Montana and Idaho in the west. The result in Montana was gained by a disagreement in the Democratic party, and whether the Republicans will be able to hold the state is doubtful. The Heinze people did not pull a very strong card after all. Senator Clark with all his money failed to buy the voters of Montana but Clark himself will hold the state senatorship till March 1905.

The Democrats have not always held the west but for a number of years these states have looked for an adjustment of grievances and better terms. Now they have almost without exception returned to their first allegiance.

The Ladies' Auxillary of the Hospital Committee are making preparations for a grand ball the proceeds of which go to provide sheets and pillow cases for the new hospital, to be given on Friday night the 21st inst., in the Miners' Union hall. The ball is to be a maskerade and it is proposed to make it an annual event.

The ladies are determined to make this ball eclipse anything of the kind ever given in Ferguson and if the sea shown in promoting it is a criterion to go by it will certainly prove an unequalled success.

Accident at Trique Train.

W. Mills while working on the junction terminal of the Trique train, had the misfortune to slip and injure himself internally. Dr. Newcombe was called in and it was considered advisable to have the patient moved to Ferguson. After a second examination the doctor found he was not as seriously injured as was first anticipated. It is now expected he will be around in a few days.

Editor P. A. O'Farrell of the Revelle in Montana, and Judge Clancy, of the same place have been arrested charged with criminal libel, preferred by D. J. Hennessy. The action is the result of an affidavit appearing in the paper above the signature of Judge Clancy in which it is alleged that Clancy had been offered a bribe four years ago by Hennessy to influence his decision in some litigation then pending between the late Marcus Daly and the Henza interests.

It is rumored that the Trail smelter has passed out of the control of the C. P. R. and has been purchased by the War Eagle and Centre Star companies.

The Servant Girl Problem.

Chicago proposes to solve the servant girl problem by requiring the girls to obtain diplomas which can only be secured by one year of satisfactory service in one city. They are to be graded as "satisfactory," "good," "remarkably efficient," "Graduate cooks," "waiting maids" and "landresses" will be classed as household servants. The girls will probably organize a union and require their employers to hold diplomas setting forth their qualities as learned during a year's apprenticeship as mistress in which they will be rated as "kind," "indulgent," "exacting," "stuck up," "too much company," "prying," "stingy," "overbearing," while the master of the house will be rated according to his deserts, as "henpecked," "rules the roost," "drinks," "sissy," "up to snuff."

Porter Talks in Spokane.

Cutter T. Porter who recently visited Ferguson and district has the following to say of this part to a Spokane Review reporter:

"The Silver Cup, near Ferguson is getting a tramway to connect with the main gauge road. This property was recently purchased by an English company, also the Nettie L., which is being equipped with a concentrator. Nettie L. ore carries grey copper and galena.

"The Ophir-Lade Co. has bonded the Lade group at the base of the Lime dikes up Gaylor creek and has bonded five or six claims on Fish creek. They are interesting eastern capital in them.

"The Minneapolis interests, headed by Rev. M. McCrossan, incorporated as the Metropolitan Company are at work on a tra. way to the Trique mine, near the Silver Cup. The property is considered to be a wonder. The McCrossan interests also built a smelter of the Vulcan type in the Lardeau, but it is not in operation. The reason assigned is lack of fluxes.

"A good deal of work is being done on Properties lying on the divide between the headwaters of the Duncan and the Lardeau rivers. The Old Gold and the Primrose groups having forces, and the Black Warrior about 25 men at work.

"The completion of the Kootenay Pacific from the head of Kootenay lake to the foot of Trout lake, and the installation of steamers on the latter have given transportation to the mines and they have taken advantage of it.

"There is no camp in British Columbia in which I have greater faith than in the Lardeau."

Sawmill Debt Completed.

Mr. D. L. Clark was in Ferguson Wednesday. He recently sold his saw mill at Trout Lake to a big lumbering syndicate represented by W. Cowan and E. L. Kinnman. This deal has been pending for several weeks and was finally closed a few days ago. The syndicate has leased 20 square miles of timber land around Trout Lake and are calling for tenders for the cutting of a million and a half feet of logs to be delivered at the mill before spring. The new concern which is ready for business will employ 125 men. It is understood there is 600,000,000 feet of timber on the land just leased consisting of cedar, hemlock, pine, fir and spruce.

A STAMP MILL

Has Been Purchased for the Oyster-Criterion

AN AERIAL TRAMWAY

Has Also Been Purchased for the Same Mine. The Above Will be Shipped to Camberton at Once.

Messrs. Pool and Lade returned to Ferguson Tuesday from the Ophir-Lade Syndicate's property on Pool creek. They say there is nothing new to report of the mine. Work is going along smoothly and rapid progress is being made. The ledges look just as good as they did a fortnight ago but no better. "In fact," said the manager, "we are not hoping for it to look better, it is good enough now. Every week adds many feet to the length of the tunnels and the raises and every time the ledges are crossed they show an abundance of the yellow metal. A force of 30 men are employed steadily and they are without exception first class miners as is evidenced by the splendid progress made."

While out this time manager Pool visited Rossland, Nelson and Spokane and purchased a ten stamp mill. This will be shipped to the mine immediately but will not be installed till next spring, by which time it is expected there will be enough high grade ore blocked out to keep the mill running steadily all summer, and while this is being stoped as much more can be blocked out, so from the start the mill can be run without interruption.

Mr. Pool also purchased an aerial tramway for the company. This will likewise be landed on the property this winter and will not be erected till the early spring. So it looks as if the Oyster-Criterion should prove a good investment for the stockholders as it has the requisites—plenty of rich free gold ore, latest improvements for treating and handling this ore and best of all its manager possesses energy, ability and experience and he is devoting his whole time to the mines best interest.

G. N. R. Lafontaine of Lisbon, Maine, father of Lady Wilfrid Laurier, is ill, suffering from muscular rheumatism and influenza. His age causes his friends to worry. The premier's wife may go to him. Last summer she spent two weeks visiting her home unknown to any except her own relatives. Mr. and Mrs. Lafontaine and son Charles have been residents of Lisbon for 12 years but they still enjoy discussing Canadian politics.

At Berlin, Ont. the Sugar Co., Limited, established in 1901 for the purpose of making sugar from beets, started the erection of a plant about six months ago, and on Oct. 30th, the first beets passed through their various channels preparatory to being tured into sugar. This is the first sugar made in Canada from sugar beets. The plant has a capacity of six hundred tons of beets daily and cost \$600,000. Employment is given to 500 or 600 men.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

There was a report current last week that the C. P. R. had decided to discontinue running the Lardo branch railway during the winter months. The report has however since been denied by the C. P. R. authorities. They say it is their intention to run the railway continuously unless Trout Lake should freeze over, which may be the case for a week or two, and thus prevent the steamboat Victoria from making her trips.

We think that unless the winter proves unusually severe a course can be kept open by the use of a good ice breaking scow. It would certainly be very disastrous to the mines and merchants of the Lardeau if communication were not kept open with Nelson for the mines are depending on that route to ship out a large quantity of ore during the winter, the merchants also depending on getting their goods in that way.

The Eagle will give a synopsis of the mining development of the Lardeau district for 1902 about the 21st of this month and would be pleased to receive information from mine managers and prospect owners along this line. What is desired is a brief description of the properties, where they are located and the amount of development done. It is necessary that this information be sent in early so it may be verified before publication.

It is important that every property of merit in the district be included in this special write up, for the issue will be very widely circulated in Canada, Europe and the United States and the merits of the vast mineral deposits of the Lardeau will be brought to the notice of monied men who are always on the lookout for good investments.

Ferguson has two feet of snow and first class sleighing. The freighters are not slow to take advantage of the good condition of the roads and are hauling large quantities of freight to town.

The condition of trade in Ferguson also continues good and most of the goods that are arriving are sent to the mines almost as fast as received. Daney's pack train is still making daily trips to mines and camps with supplies. The autumn was a good one in every way and Ferguson will reap much benefit next season from the work and improvements done this fall.

The time is approaching rapidly when we may expect the British Columbia legislature to meet, and we believe stress should be brought to bear on our legislators to appropriate more money for roads and trails in the province for 1903 than was allotted for the purpose in 1902. Last winter a meeting was held in Ferguson for the purpose of deciding what new work and improvements were urgently required and the sum decided on by the meeting together with an appended statement in detail of work necessary to the Ferguson district was laid before the Public Works Department by our representative Mr. Thos. Taylor, M. P. P. The minister, however, explained to Mr. Taylor that the estimates had already been prepared and on account of a shortage of funds no supplementary appropriation could be given this year.

We will say in justice to Mr. Taylor that he worked hard to get more money for his riding for he felt, and the people of the district felt that this district had not been given its due proportion, but his efforts were unavailing. So that no excuse of this kind may be forthcoming next year we trust the time will be taken by the forlorn and our needs put before the department early.

Great strikes were made last season in the development of properties all over this district and next year many of the owners will be prepared to make shipments providing the roads and trails are given the improvement that we believe is due them. Money spent in trail and road building in a district proven to contain the mineral wealth that the Lardeau has is always money well spent. Looking at the matter from a purely business standpoint the few thousand dollars that are necessary to put our roads and trails in good condition would so increase the output of ore from Lardeau mining properties that the money would not be long in returning to the government coffers in taxes, especially at the present unjustly high rate of taxation that is levied on minerals and mining requisites.

If the mining classes are compelled to pay what seems to be discriminating taxes, let a just proportion, at least, of this revenue spent in making the marketing of the minerals feasible and cut down the expense in this direction as much as possible. We believe that mining districts like the Lardeau pay for better roads than are provided. Let us be up and doing.

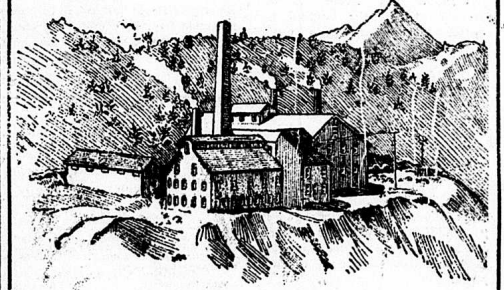
