DISASTROUS CLOUD BURST

Heppner, Oregon, Destroved Instantaneously and 500 People Lose Their Lives.

Five hundred people lost their live in a cloudburst that almost instantly destroyed the town of Heppner, Oregon, at 6 o'clock June 15. the county seat of Morrow Heppner is the county seat of Morrow cou had about 1,250 inhabitants.

All the telegraph and telephone wires are down and no accurate information can be had, but the estimated loss of life is based on the most reliable reports received up to 12 o'clock last night. A report from Ione, 11 miles from Heppner, is to the effect that 200 bodies have been recovered. that 200 bodies have been recovered. A messenger who arrived at Ione said that a wall of water 20 feet high rushed down into the gulch in which Hepp-ner is situated carrying everything

The flood came suddenly, so suddenly The flood came suddenly, so suddenly that the inhabitants were unable to seek places of safety and were carried down to death by the awful rush of reaser. Almot the entire resident portion of the town was destroyed, but some of the business part, which was on higher ground, escaped. Huge boulders weighing a ton were carried down by the current and many people were eaught and crushed against the rocky bluff. Early in the afternoon a thunderstorm set many of the streams socky buff. Early in the afternoon a thunderstorm set many of the streams diverliowing their banks in a short time and bridges were swept away like straws. As soon as the flood had subsided the work of relief was begun by the clitizens of the town. Dozens of bodies were found lodged along the bend of Willow creek, and in several places they were piled over one another. A late dispatch from Heppner says: "Willow creek, which on Sunday

"Willow creek, which on Sunday wiped out more than half of the town, has strunk to the size of an innocent brook. About \$500,000 worth of property is erased from the wealth of Morcounty.

"A rigid emergency government im-presses able-bodied men into the work of saving the town from plague-breed-

casease. Several thousand persons have a "Several thousand persons have arrived from the outside, and an army of men and horses is turning over the debris. Women take charge of the bodies as they are borne out of the wreckage by the men. There is no time for ceremony in the burlals. The bodies are shrouded in coarse white clothes, placed in rough boxes, and hurried to the cemetaries on wagons. Medicines are not needed neither are physicians. not needed, neither are physicians nor nurses.
"The town must be cleansed to es-

cape pestilence. It must have more men to help in cleaning, and provisions to feed the workers. Many families are entirely destitute, all their worldly possessions having been carried away."

via Congratulated But Asked to Mete Out Punishment to Thugs.

The new Servian King telegraphed on the 17th inst. the following message to be proclaimed to his subjects:

"Thanks to the favor of God and the will of the people, I am called to the throne of my ancestors. I submit myself to the popular decision and today ascend to the throne of Servia. I consider it to be my first duty to thank God for the favor accorded me and I express the hope that the people express the nope that the people will hail my succession as an event which will give Servia an era of repose, progress and order. I give my word to respect the right acquired by all. I will be the protector of the legality and well being of the people. I call upon the heads of the church and the milithe neads of the church and the mil-tary and civil functionaries to retain their functions and execute them con-scientiously. I declare that I banish from memory all acts committed dur ing the past 40 years bearing upon me. Every honest Servian will find under my reign protection for his moral and material life. The motto of my dynasty is 'For the sacred cross and cherished It is with that motto assured of the attachment of the army and church that I ascend the throne as Peter I, king of Servia."

Following is the Russian note in brief published in the official Gazette: The imperial government, while hailing the election of the new monwishing all success, which he has so well begun, to the supreme head of the Servian people, which is allied to Russia by ties of religion, can nevertheless sia by ties of religion, can never access

Of course, the entire Servian nation or army can not be held responsible for the crime, which revolts public conscience, yet it would be dangerous to Servia's inter-nal peace not to cause expiation of the

"Their Russian coreligionists offer to God supplications for the repose of the souls of King Alexander and his consort, who have met an untimely end, and they invoke the blessings of the Almighty on King Peter for the welfare and prosperity of the Servian peo-

His Eminence, the Most Rev. Her-bert Vaughan, Cardinal and Arch-Westminster, died at midnight Friday.

Cardinal Vaughan was born April 15, 1832. He became Roman Catholic Archbishop of Westminster in 1892. He had been ill more than three months. Late in March it was thought he could not survive more than a fev

The cardinal, who had been sinking or some weeks from heart disease and dropsy died peacefully. His death was not expected so soon. On Friday Cardinal Vaughan was wheeled in a bath chair about the corridors of St. Joseph's college, which he founded. On Threaden he expected in the college. Thursday he appeared in the college chapel in full cardinal's robes, and made a farewell address to his bishops and priests.

The new lists for the registration of voters were opened on the 17th instant and any man may register and be therefore entitled to vote who is of the full age of 21 years, is a British subject, has been a resident of the province for the past six months and has been a resident of the electoral dis-trict one month immediately preceeding the date on which application is made for registration. Applications may be made before the collector of votes for a riding, a J. P. magistrate, government agent, mining recorder, postmaster or provincial constable.

I doing so the government had yielded to none in its abhorrence of the atrocious outrages in the annals of his-

The British minister at Belgrade, Sir George Banham, has been instructed to absent himself from Belgrade until some time after the accession of the new monarch.

This attitude has also been assumed by France, Germany and Italy, while Austria and Russia appeared prepared

to acknowledge the new king.
While Great Britain could not use fully propose to undertake the task of ecuring joint action of the powers to secure the punishment of the perpetrators of the massacres, it was not in-tended to maintain ordinary relations with the powers concerned in the affair.

The Lardo Railway

A dispatch was received yesterday from the C. P. R. superintendent's office, Nelson, stating that two or three weeks must elapse yet before the com-pany could hope to re-open the Lardo branch railway. One bridge is wash-ed out 12 miles from Gerrard and another is badly shaken, but the water is yet too high to permit of piles being driven. When the water subsides reconstruction will begin.

TAKING THINGS EASY.

There is very little interest being displayed locally in politics. Whether or not the people believe Hon. Robert Green's election in this riding is a certainty we do not profess to know, but anyway there is not the usual interest that we have been accustomed to see follow a dissolu-Of course it may be thought that the time is premature and they are waiting to see what material will be presented by the opposition in the form of a candidate.

In former elections this district was included in the Revelstoke riding, now it is a part of the Kaslo riding and it will naturally take some little time for the electors to adapt themselves to the new order of things. Not until organization is complete and a meeting is held will there be much enthusiasm

In the Revelstoke constituency no less than four names have been mentioned as probable candidates for the seat. First, and seemingly the most popular man, among those whom we have heard mention the matter, is Mr. Thos. Taylor, the member who sat for this combined riding in the last house. Mr. Taylor is, of course, a Conservative, and was one of the three who were elected in the last general election as a party man of the Conservative He has said that he would prefer to drop out of politics for the present, but there is a disposition of the party leaders to press Mr. Taylor to accept nomination.

Another name spoken of by the Conservatives is that of J. M. Scott, president of the Revelstoke association. J. M. Kellie is also mentioned as the probable nominee of the Liberals, and J. W. Bennett will probably enter the contest on the labor or Socialist ticket.

T., passed from its status of a town into the more exalted standing of At that hour his honor the lie tenant governor gave the royal assent to the bills passed at the session of the legislative assembly, which has just closed, and one of these bills incorporated Regina as a city.

With the giving of the royal assent the wildest enthusiasm reigned. Flags were everywhere manifest, and many buildings were decorated with bunting. Locomotives and traction engine whis-

ties, bells, horns and hundreds of voices, greeted the new city.
