The Lardeau Is Keeping up Its End in Mine Development and Output.

The Boundary District Also Show Great Activity-But Few Idle Men in Kootenays.

The Metropolitan Gold and Silver Mining company that is operating the Triune mine above Ferguson, have had a remarkably good summer, and, departing from the plan of former years, they will work the property all winter. They are letting a contract for several hundred feet of tunneling for several hundred feet of tunneling to develop the mine further and thus open up new stoping ground. This will give the company a chance to make next season a record-breaker in ore shipments. It is hoped to have the tramway in shape to handle the output by the time they are ready to ship next year, and that will greatly lessen the transportation costs. The Triune looks good though there was a lot of fine ore taken out the past summer. .

The Silver Cup has a large force at work, most of which are working on the outside getting ready for the winter and making ready to ship on a large scale over the new trams to the company's compressor at Five Mile. Probably no mining company in Brit-Fronday no mining company in Brita-ish Columbia spent so much money in development and installing new ma-chinery the past season as the Silver Cup Mines, Ltd., but it is questionable if there is a better mining proposition in the province having allver-lead ore in the province having silver-lead ore than the same mine. Certainly no company is more deserving of good re-sults than this one, and few have bet-ter chances of resping big dividends. The Cup is a remarkably good mine and is owned by a company that is not afraid to spend money in order to ob-tain the best results.

The production for the year ending June 30, 1903, of the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting and Power company of Phoenix, B. C. amounted to 12,551,000 pounds of fine copper, 277,000 ounces of silver, and 36,121 ounces of gold, for which was received the sum of \$2,232,741, while the rents and real estate sales brought in \$38,-511, making a total of \$2,371,252. The foregoing represents foregoing represents the net proceeds as the freight to New York, refining and all other charges are deducted from the gross receipts. The costs are put down as follows: Working expense at the mine and smelter, \$1,136,830; foreign ore purchased, \$72,954; foreign foreign ore purchased, \$75,000; foreign material purchased, \$760,000; making a total of \$1,975,789. The net profit is, therefore, \$295,463, which together with the surplus for the preceeding year brings up the total to \$895,555. During the year there was expended on new construction at the mines and smelter the sum of \$207,000.

A billiard room and ssiloon are in a detached building 100 feet away, and situated above the hotel are five neat cottages. All these have lavatories and private plunge baths. The hotel has a public parlor and reading room, a postoffice, money-order office, express and telegraph offices and a C. P. R. agent is stationed in the hotel.

An excellent view is obtained from the balconies of the mountains and the beautiful Arrow lakes stretching out arges plying back and forth between in front, Arrowhead and West Robson. climate is always pleasant except for an abundance of rain. Vegetables of all kinds thrive and the hotel is sup-plied from the gardens. Though Hai-cyon is small it has most of the features of a town. Mr. McNaught is a magistrate and a provincial constable is also stationed at the hotel. Base ball grounds and a lawn tennis court are provided for the use of guests, and Mr. and Mrs. McNaught do their best to provide entertainment for guests.

A Strong Military Establish of a Hundred Thousand Men to be Maintained.

A dispatch from Ottawa, dated Oct 9th, states that the minister of militia on the subject of his estimates, made an important speech in the house. He spoke of the importance of strengthen He ing the militia. Canada had already had to protect herself from invasion from abroad and from within. In 1867 the expenditure on the militia was 32 cents a head and it was 60 cents last

He looked forward to having one hundred thousand men ready for ser-vice. Of these he would proceed with vice. Of these ne would proceed with the enlistment of forty thousand. Twenty-five per cent of the whole would be called upon for annual citli, but all the officers and non-commis sioned officers would have to drill. The solder 60 per cent would be called upon when required for emergency, and would be supplied with arms and am-munition. Civil Service Reform

A late dispatch from Victoria says Since returning to the capital after the election, the cabinet ministers have gone into the question of civil service reform, a matter which they were pledged to take up if granted an extension of office by the country.

Several reductions of the working

staff have already been decided upon where it could be done without imparing the efficiency of the service.

About ten or twelve civil servants will be dropped, these being in the main temporary assistants. The list includes two men in the land registry office, Victoria. one vacancy in the same department which will not be filled; two in the lands and works office, Victoria, and two or three others on the outside connected with the same epartment.

Vancouver will lose one from its land registry office, a caretaker from the court house, and a stenographer. The change takes place in six weeks

and will effect a saving of \$20,000

early.

It will not be the policy of the go ernment to reduce salaries generally, but it is understood this will be done in the case of Seymour Hastings O'Dell, secretary to the minister of finance.

The new tariff on freight rates promulgated by the Canadian Pacific railway, as far as can be gathered, will be of immense advantage to the West and Northwest. It is impossible to single out items, but there is a substantial re-duction on wheat and flour to Fort William and all eastern points, and this it is said ought to mean a total advantage this season to the farmers of ver one million of dollars.

Reductions, of course, are also made on various other articles and general merchandise, not only over the main line, but also on the branches and leased lines. As regards Calgary the effect of all this, especially as it covers the Calgary and Edmonton branch, will be very extensive and ought to will be very extensive and ought to stimulate trade in our city to an eror-mous extent. A lowering of charges, naturally reduces the cost of articles, placing them within the reach of a larger number, and consequently the volume of business is very much in-

In many cases even a small reduction is sufficient for manufacturers or wholesale merchants to establish branch departments, and the way now

seems fully open to those people to come in large numbers to Calgary. The action of the company ought to be much appreciated by the people and will have, we also feel, a direct impulse on the company's business in the way of increasing the freight to be arried.-Calgary Herald.

MARTIN'S EXIT.

We see much comment on the retirement of Hon. Joseph Martin from politics, but however strange it may seem, the press of the province, both Liberal and Conservative, is unanimous in asserting a belief that the country will suffer no loss in Ioe's retirement.

After figuring so prominently as Jos. Martin has in the game of politics for the past twenty years it seems strange that he has not some friends who will express sorrow at this latest step. Yet it is not so strange to one who has followed Mr. Martin's political record in British Columbia and formerly in Manitoba. He is undoubtedly a man of a great deal of ability, but we certainly believe he does not put it to good use in politics.

SEEKING A LEADER

The Liberals of the province ap pear to be experiencing no little difficulty in selecting a leader for the party in the house. Some thought McInnes would be the man if Martin were out of the way, but a somewhat unnexpected opposition has sprung up in some of the strongest wings of the party and there is liable to develop no end of discontent and trouble before an acceptable leader can be decided upon.

Smith Curtis, ex-M. L. A. for Rossland, was approached by a Miner representative last week for an opinion regarding the leadership. He said in part:

"McInnes is absolutely impos sible if Liberalism is to emerge from the cold shades of opposition by putting honorable men at the helm of the Liberal ship. The course of McInnes for the past two and a half sessions of the late legislature was in every way as bad as that of Martin, and in some ways even worse. He, Martin and Eberts were all in the same boat, promoting the Dunsmuir and C. P. R. Corporative interests to the detriment of the province. McInnes stood for the attempted looting of the province of its lands and cash and actually went on the hustings in Victoria and urged the election of Colonel Prior, whose selection meant the endorsation of the huge grants of land and money promised Mackenzie & Mann for their Canadian Northern railway scheme. Later he joined Prior's government, with its inherited load of the sins of the Dunsmuir government. No. no, McInnes won't do at all tor leader, and should not even be allowed in the caucus of the party. He has done nothing to save or protect the country from bad govern

niving at the very things that have made the late government smell to heaven."

EDITORIAL NOTES

It seems to be the general belief that the present government of B. C. will prove a good one and the best for the country that we have ever had. If McBride lives up to the platform of the party, which undoubtedly he will, the province will be well governed for the next four years. The government have a majority of two over all and on most of the measures that will be introduced we think the two Socialists will support the government. The Clarion says: "While the Clarion cannot speak for the Socialist party, it is of the opinion that Comrades Hawthornthwaite and Williams will support the Conservatives or any other governmen which will give the workers of the province the most in their interests.

Ferguson did not experience a growth during the past season that came up to expectations, but the district made great advancement. The season was very wet and cold some of the mining companies did not start operations till late and several of our mining men were late returning from the outside. Then, although two sawmills were cutting steadily, the output was contracted for in advance by the Silver Cup mine for use at Five Mile. There will be a largely increased number of men working in the camp this coming winter and the town will be prosperous as far as one can judge in advance.

As will be seen on another page, the C. P. R. are contemplating some changes in connection with the Lardeau .route and also the Arrow Lake route for the winter months. The discontinuance of the boat service between Nakusp and Robson will, however not interfere with the mail service, though it will necessitate a number of changes for passengers making the trip. The change of time on the Kootenay lake will make travel and mail more convenient for this end of the run.

Most of the members of the present legislative assembly have pledged their support to certain measures drafted by the Provincial Mining Association that will be of benefit to quartz mining throughout the province. So we may expect to obtain due recognition for the mining industry and the statutes amended to conform with the needs of this growing business.

The October number of the Min ing Record has an excellent writeup of the Lardeau district from the pen of E. Jacobs, who went through the country in August and looked it over thoroughly. Mr. Jacobs is a conscientious writer and what he sends out can be depended upon to be accurate, and what is more he takes great pains to find out existing conditions in detail when he visits a mine or a camp.

A Novel Warship

Sweden has added a novel warship to Sweden has added a nover, warship to her navy in the form of a vessel for transporting a military balloon, con-structed in Augsburg, Germany, for use along the coast in time of war. This vessel has just made its first trial trip at sea. It is about 120 feet long,

trial trip at sea. It is about 120 feet long, and resembles an iron prasm barge or lighter. The greater part being given up to the storage and use of the balloon and its accessories. It is towed by a steamer which conveys it from point to make an ascension. It also contains the necessary machinery for producing hydrogen and for manosurving the balloon. The craw comprises two officers and sixteen sailers.

A recent census taken for the firm, A recent census taken for the firm, shows that the Krupp Works in Germany employ in all 41,013 persons, of whom 4,046 were classed as managers, clerks, bookkeepers, overseers, etc., and 36,967 as workmen. The total number of persons supported by these works includin employees, their wives children and other dependants, was 147,645. The average wages paid last year were 4,52 marks, or \$1.08 per day.
