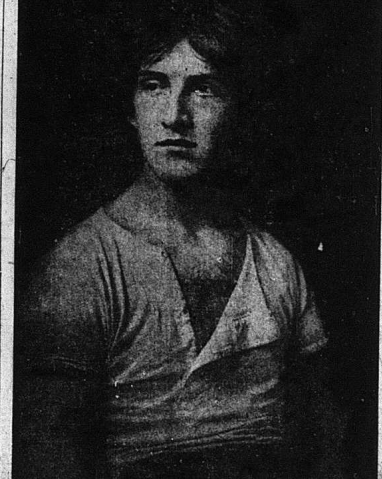

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jobs of a class that performs no useful labor. If this permission to work without pay, they and their families must starve.

The wage system is the cause of starvation, prostitution, crime, war, stunted bodies and warped minds for the workers, while it gives to the capitalist rulers of the world the pick of the world's markets for education, travel and all that makes life worth living.

This is divided into two hostile classes—capitalist and wage-workers. This condition has brought into the Socialist Party, the political expression of the struggle of the working class for power. This party owns a regular political party, a part of the international Socialist movement.

With a system of industry owned and operated by the workers, the struggle for existence would be shifted from the individual to the class as a whole.

The capitalist class, owning the means of production and distribution, finances the Republican, Democratic and other parties, making them faithful servants of the capitalist class, thereby completely controlling the political and economic life of the state and nation—in effect, making government an executive committee of the capitalist class.

This fact demands an inevitable conclusion: the organization of the working class into a political party, therefore the party of the working class, shall be everywhere and always, shall always and everywhere, until the present system of wage-slavery is utterly abolished, make the answer to this question its guiding rule of conduct.

With this legislation advanced the interests of the working class and aid the workers in their class struggle. The Socialist Party is for it; if it does not, the Socialist Party is absolutely not for it.

In accordance with this principle, the Socialist Party pledged itself to conduct all the public affairs of the state in such a manner as to promote the interests of the working class.

Tom Watson "Flays" Socialists

In the course of a lengthy review of "The Jungle," in the current issue of his magazine, Tom Watson, late presidential candidate of the populist party, has had occasion to criticize Socialism.
After a careful reading of the criticism two questions present themselves. First, is the editor of Watson's magazine an ignorant of modern socialism as the review would indicate?

We think these questions are legitimate in view of the reputation of the author as a writer and historian, for when we read that socialism means "an equal division among all men of all the property of the world," we shall not impose on our readers to reply to this mildewed and hackneyed objection.

It is in the course of his review that Watson says that the Socialists are "the man of 'culture' but not of 'common sense'."
