## CRISIS CONFRONTS US

That the Socialist press is passing through a crisis at the present time is plain to everyone at all familiar with the subject. THE SOCIALIST is not the only Socialist paper suffering for lack of financial support. The Appeal to Reason has but recently acknowledged a falling off in circulation of over 100,000, not including the Ganadian list which the Ganadian government has in one opinion unjustifiably disqualified.

In its last issue The Worker reports a deficit for the quarter just ended of over \$57 a week, an increase of \$18 a week over the previous quarter. Other Socialist papers do not show any appreciable signs of prosperity and if it were not for the local advertising which they carry their condition would undoubtedly be more critical than it is.

#### WHAT IS RESPONSIBLE?

WHAT IS RESPONSIBLE?

Just what is responsible for this state of affairs it is difficult to say. The fact that Socialists and workingmen generally are being called upon for support for many different causes is probably more responsible for it then anything else. Another reason may be found in the increasing amount of space being devoted in the daily papers and magazines to subjects akir; Socialism. The Socialist papers are no longer the sole medium of expression of social discontent. As a result the attention of Socialism and progressive workers is being diverted from their own press, and whether any or all these reasons are correct the fact stands out plainly that the Socialist press generally is in a pretty bad way.
